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Impact Report 2025

Reflecting on 2025

2025 marked a significant milestone for Women on the Frontline Ministries, as we were formally approved by the Charity Commission as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) in March, strengthening the foundation on which we build our work with the women we serve.

At the start of the year, we established two working groups, Projects and Operations, and Funding, Comms and Marketing to bring greater structure and shared ownership to our work. While our Funding, Comms and Marketing group has continued consistently throughout the year, we made the decision in April to pause the Projects and Operations working group due to the challenges of retaining volunteers for this role. We are honest about this as a real learning point for how we resource and sustain working groups going forward.

Our frontline services continued to grow. Across the year, 156 women attended our daytime drop-in, 68 women were engaged during evening outreach and received gift bags, and we delivered 103 one-to-one support meetings. We made 16 referrals for services including GP registration, HC1 prescriptions, substance abuse support, counselling, and signposting for poverty alleviation such as foodbanks and immigration advice.

In May, we hosted a worship evening titled "Freedom for the Soul," welcoming over 55 attendees. The event featured three guest speakers, including a young woman who bravely shared her own story of being trafficked into prostitution. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with many attendees asking us to hold another event. We were also delighted to occupy additional office space this year, enabling us to recruit additional staff members and grow our capacity to serve.

Partnership working remained a priority. In June, we ran a joint two-day initiative with Victory Outreach London City Church and London City Mission, delivering evening street outreach and a pampering session for women connected with Change Grow Live (CGL Newham), which supports vulnerable women with drug and alcohol dependencies, and Treasurers Foundation, which supports ex-offenders. That same month, our team enjoyed a retreat day at St Katherine's, taking part in a pottery activity together. It was a valuable moment of rest and connection for those who give so much throughout the year.

We were honoured to receive three years of unrestricted funding from the Specialist Programme of Lloyds Bank Foundation, alongside organisational and development support. We saw this a significant vote of confidence in our work and a foundation for greater stability going forward.

In October, ahead of our main annual fundraising event, we ran a street campaign in Stratford on 25th October, with over 20 participants holding A3 posters bearing the message "It's Not OK" — challenging silence, exploitation, victim-blaming and trafficking, and raising awareness through social media reach.

Our annual fundraising event took place on 22nd November and was a resounding success. We were joined by three guest speakers, each with lived experience of exploitation, whose courage in sharing their stories moved and challenged our supporters.

We closed the year, as always, with a Christmas celebration at our drop-in on 17th December, and a further Christmas gathering for our women's group where nine women joined us for food, fun and faith-inspired reflection.

None of what we have been able to do in 2025 would have been possible without the generosity and faithfulness of those who stand alongside us. We are deeply thankful for our funders, partners and supporters, whose continued investment in this work allows us to reach women who so often feel unseen and unheard. It is your belief in our mission that turns care into action.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees

Trustees' Report

The Trustees present their annual report and Financial Statements for the year ending 31 December 2025.

Charitable Object

The Charity is governed by an approved Governing Document which states the principal purpose of the charity as follows:

The advancement of the Christian faith for the public benefit including but not limited to the generality of the foregoing by means of caring, listening and helping women on the streets involved in or affected by prostitution or sexual exploitation.

To promote health, advance education and relieve need for women involved in or affected by prostitution or any form of sexual exploitation by the provision of Christian-based outreach services and a safe place for recreation or other leisure time activities with a view to improving the conditions of life and promoting the moral and social welfare of women.

The promotion of such other purposes as are exclusively charitable under the laws of England and Wales as the trustees determine

Charitable Incorporated Organisation Status

Women On Frontline Ministries (WOFM) is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) registered with the Charity Commission on 28 March 2025. The CIO was established to continue the work previously carried out by the former charity, WOFM, which transferred its activities and assets to the CIO on 28 March 2025.

The charity is governed by its constitution. Trustees are appointed in accordance with the provisions of that constitution.

Organisation Structure and Decision-making Process

Trustees are accepted in accordance with the Constitution which requires them to be or to have been publicly declared their faith in Jesus Christ.

The Trustees' meeting normally takes place monthly and has responsibility for the overall policy of the Charity. All Trustees are encouraged to take an appropriate part in the spiritual and practical tasks involved in the furtherance of the charitable objective.

Relevant matters may be submitted to the Trustee meeting by members of the Trustees for guidance, or consideration by the Trustees. Though the Constitution permits decisions to be made at Trustee meetings by appropriate majorities, WOFM seeks to work by consensus wherever possible.

Objectives and Activities

The Impact Report (pages 4 to 5) demonstrates how the principal objectives set out above are being achieved. The aim is to show the love of Jesus Christ in both word and deed.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

WOFM Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the Charities Act,
- to follow the procedure laid down in the general Directions given by the Charity Commission (under section 145 (5)(b) of the Charities Act, and
- to state whether matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination was carried out in accordance with the general Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by WOFM and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeking explanations from the Trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair' view and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

Independent examiner's statement

In connection with my examination, no material matters have come to my attention which gives me the cause to believe that in any material respect:

- accounting records were not kept in accordance with section 130 of the Charities Act or
- the accounts do not accord with the accounting records
- the accounts do not comply with the applicable requirements concerning the form and content of accounts set out in the charities Regulation 2008 other than the requirement that the accounts give 'true and fair' view which is not a matter considered as part of an independent examination.

I have come across no other matters in connection with the examination to which attention should be drawn in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.

Annual Report

The year to 31 December 2025 spans two distinct accounting periods, reflecting WOFM's transition to Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) status. The predecessor charity's final period ran from 1 January to 28 March 2025, at which point its funds and assets, including cash and the charity's motor vehicle, were formally transferred to the new CIO. The CIO's first accounting period then ran from 28 March to 31 December 2025.

In its final period, the predecessor charity received total income of £20,161.79 and incurred total expenditure of £21,607.74. On 28 March 2025, cash funds of £30,707.02 and the motor vehicle, with an estimated transfer value of £16,000, were transferred to the CIO as part of the transfer of the charity's operations to the new legal structure.

Following its establishment in March 2025, the CIO received total income of £60,485.09 for the remainder of the year, including £53,698.50 in restricted grants. This included significant funding from the Lloyds Bank Foundation Specialist Programme, alongside support from other trusts and foundations. Total expenditure for the period was £64,823.95, reflecting continued investment in frontline delivery, including outreach and drop-in services, staff costs, rent and organisational development.

During the year, WOFM was supported by a blend of trust and foundation grants, church giving and other donations. This mix of funding, together with the resources transferred from the predecessor charity, enabled us to sustain and strengthen our frontline services throughout a year of significant organisational change.

Our expenditure continued to prioritise the delivery of our frontline services, ensuring vulnerable women affected by prostitution, sexual exploitation or abuse are met with trauma-informed care, a safe and welcoming daytime drop-in, and opportunities for long-term empowerment. Other expenditure covered essential running costs, including administration, fundraising and outreach.

1.Accounting Policies

These accounts were prepared on a receipts and payments basis, with all revenue and expenses shown on a cash basis. Non monetary assets are shown at estimates of the value at the end of the year.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds consist of funds that the Trustees may use for charitable purposes at their discretion. Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance to specific instructions imposed by donors or have been raised for the Charity for particular purposes.

2. Transfer of Assets from Predecessor Charity

Women on the Frontline Ministries (Charity Number 1150842) transferred its assets, liabilities and operations to the newly formed CIO on 28 March 2025. The CIO is a new legal entity and these are the first Receipts and Payments accounts.

The transfer was made in accordance with a resolution of the trustees of the predecessor charity and the constitution of the CIO. The transfer represented the movement of operational activities of the charity to a more appropriate legal structure.
